Budget 2019: Health Priorities for Australia

As the commentators have remarked, the Federal Budget timing is unusual, being so close to a federal election. It raises speculation that a prime aim is short term to attract votes at next month's poll.

Certainly the health budget is packed with a myriad of new measures ranging from an end to the Medicare freeze, more MRIs, new adult walk-in mental health centres and more for life-saving drugs for rare diseases, to name just a few.

One measure we have particularly welcomed however lays the foundation for long term, significant development of 21st Century health care. It is the new primary care/chronic care funding of \$448.5 million to improve access for people aged over 70 by enabling them to enter agreements for more supportive integrated care with their GP.

The changes are directed at encouraging continuity of care for those with chronic conditions and will remove the Medicare barrier to payment for patient contacts that are not face-to-face.

They will mean that instead of having to go to the surgery for script repeats, test results and the like, patients will be able to organize via phone or email.

This initiative is an important step forward for health care in Australia because of the hoped-for stimulus it will bring to general practice for GPs and other clinicians to step outside boundaries of traditional face-to-face care and make the most of modern communications technology for the benefit of patients.

For many older people the journey to the GP can be a challenge --- one trip too many --- so that it becomes easy to let slip the need to collect a script or check on a test. While there are many GPs who will communicate with patients outside the surgery but not charge, there is a strong argument for providing an incentive to them and their practice for the time and attention spent outside the bounds of Medicare payment rules.

It also opens the way towards more consumer-centred health care where the individual's life and needs receive more focus. More flexible payments will equip general practices to more easily deliver team-based care involving health professionals like pharmacists and exercise physiologists working with the GP and open up more scope for consumer education and self-management.

We would have liked to see the innovation extended to children under five, given the time pressures facing busy parents with young children, for whom a trip to the doctor can be something of an ordeal.

And whichever party wins the election, the Consumers Health Forum will be pressing for this primary health development to become the genesis for a community-wide primary health system that reflects contemporary realities.

Breast implants: things to consider before having the procedure

People may get breast implants for many reasons, including cosmetic enhancement and reconstruction after surgery. Breast implants differ in their size, shape, filling and texture. They may be filled with saline (sterile salt water) or with silicone gel. The surface of the implant may be smooth or textured. Breast implants are not lifetime devices and need to be replaced after 10 to 15 years.
